**REQUEST UNDER THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT 2000 Ref No: FOI2018/07311**

I write in connection with your request for information received on 24th December. I note you seek access to the following information:

**For the following years: 2014/15, 2015/16, 2016/17 and 2017/18**

- 1 The number of incidents you attended involving a mobility scooter**
- 2 The number of incidents you attended involving a mobility scooter in an RTC**
- 3 The number of incidents you attended involving a mobility scooter in collision with a person**
- 4 The number of incidents you attended involving a mobility scooter in collision with an animal**

**I am using the term “mobility scooter”. Please take this to include the legal term “invalid carriage”.**

I am required by the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (The Act) to handle all requests in a manner that is blind to the identity of the requestor. Any information released in response to a request is regarded as being published and therefore, in the public domain without caveat.

Following enquiries within the Force please see our response below.

**Response** - The information requested in question 1 is not centrally recorded and therefore a manual search of Bedfordshire police systems currently would exceed the time limit.

Unfortunately this means it is not possible to suggest a way to refine this request, as even if the date range were reduced it would still require hundreds of records to be manually checked.

We therefore, consider that the cost of complying with your request for information would exceed the appropriate limit of £450 as has been stated in the Freedom of Information (Fees & Appropriate Limit) Regulations 2004.

Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 provides that –  
*“Section 1(1) does not oblige a public authority to comply with a request for information if the authority estimates that the cost of complying with the request would exceed the appropriate limit.”*

Section 17(5) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 requires Bedfordshire Police, when refusing to provide such information (because the cost of compliance exceeds the appropriate limit) to provide you the applicant with a notice which states that fact.

In accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000 this letter acts as a Refusal Notice under Section 12 of the Freedom of Information Act.

However, I am able to provide the following information relative to your request, retrieved before the fees limit was exceeded. I hope this is helpful however; it does not affect our legal right to rely on the fees regulations for the remainder of your request.

**Question 2:** the number of injury collisions involving mobility scooters recorded on our system for 2016/17 – 3 & 2017/18 – 2.

**Question 3:** mobility scooters coming into contact with a person rather than a vehicle 2016/17 – 1 & 2017/18 – 0

**Question 4:** mobility scooters coming into contact with an animal rather than a vehicle - 2016/17 – 0 & 2017/18 – 0
